

Ti Sonson ak Pouvwa Tanbou - Ti Sonson and the Powers of the Drum

Afoutayi Haitian Dance, Music and Arts is a performance company and nonprofit arts organization incorporated in the state of Minnesota and fiscally sponsored by the Indigenous Roots in Saint Paul, MN.

Our mission is to promote Haitian and Afro-Caribbean heritage and diversify contemporary representations of Haiti through music, art, dance, and history education. We envision a world where Haitian and Afro-Caribbean cultural heritage is a fundamental part of youth education and success to enrich communities of different backgrounds.

In 2009, Djenane Saint Juste arrived from Haiti and founded the company in the Bay Area to address the serious lack of Haitian cultural representation. In its augural year, Afoutavi hosted the first Haitian Dance, Music and Art Festival at Mission High School in San Francisco on the anniversary of the Battle of Vertieres, honoring the turning point in the Haitian War of Liberation through a traditional opening ceremony, community gathering, workshops, performances, and lectures. During its fiveyear tenure in the Bay Area, the company performed original works interpreting the Haitian tradition of Vodou at prestigious events and institutions such as the Cuba Caribe Festival, Mission Cultural Center, Dance Mission Theater, ODC Dance, San Francisco Ethnic Dance Festival, and Stanford University.

The company relocated to the Twin Cities in 2014 and continues to grow as Minnesota's premier Haitian arts and cultural organization. Until 2018, Afoutayi presented its hallmark annual festival and developed it into a hub for Afro-centric movement and music through its collaborations with notable artists from the African and Afro-Caribbean diaspora. Today, Afoutayi hosts residencies, workshops, ceremonies, and lectures in schools and the community to challenge students and attendees to think and move outside of their familiar habits. Ti Sonson ak Pouvwa Tanbou -Ti Sonson and the Power of the Drums, an original piece extracted from the trilingual children's book of Djenane Saint Juste, is a bright spark, highlighting joy and

resilience in Haitian culture.

In Haiti, dance is not just a physical phenomenon; it's a social, cultural, and historical product that connects us all. Dance is a vital way for Haitians to express themselves, to connect with their ancestors, to heal, and celebrate life; In this piece, different aspects of Haitian culture and its connection with the African continents will be presented through the life of Ti Sonson, the main character of the book who loves "Tanbou" drums. Tanbou was one of the first mediums of mass communication in Ayiti; "Tanbou" is also an instrument of peace and healing underlying all community gatherings. When being played, this heritage from West Africa invites us to dance. Therefore, as you hear the drums, imagine the high green mountains protected by Gran Bwa Ile, the cool ocean breeze that carries, the loving songs of Mèt Agwe and Lasirèn, and you will smile as you witness "Larèn Soley" the shining Queen sun dancing in the blue Caribbean sky. And then. as your heart connects with our drums, take your scarves, stand, dance, and sing with us.

Ti Sonson (Little Sonson) lives with his mother, father and grandmother in a cut stone house near Fort Jacques, a locality in Haiti. His mother is a machann fritay (street food vendor) in Fèmat, his father is a tap tap driver who travels from Fèmat-Petyonvil and his grandmother is a vegetable seller. Toutous is Ti Sonson's dog and his best friend and Bòs Asona himself is Ti Sonson's late grandfather. Ti Sonson likes to spend time with his family and help with the different chores he has to do every day around the house. One day, his mother had a disagreement with his grandmother. The conflict escalated to such an extent that it lasted for several days, to the point that Ti Sonson was very upset about this problem which caused them not to spend time together as a family as they usually do. That's why he tried many strategies to help the family unite while he himself discovered a new path for his life.

Choreographers

Djenane Saint Juste - Founder and Artistic Director of AFOUTAYI. A native of Haiti, Dienane Saint Juste is a professional choreographer, dancer, actress, writer, storyteller and vocalist with over 30 years of experience specializing in Haitian traditional dance and folklore. She is a part time model with over 10 years of experience in Runway, Swimsuit & Lingerie, Commercial Model, Fitness, and Parts. In 2003 she won the Haitian T.V beauty Contest Miss Videomax and since then have been working with different Haitian and international photographers and designers. She received extensive training in Traditional Haitian dance, Ballet, Hip Hop, Modern, Jazz, and Ballroom dance at the Institut de Danse JAKA. Institut



de Dance Vivianne Gauthier, and Artcho Dance Company in Haiti. She has a bachelor degree Physical Education and sport from Escuela Internacional de Educación física y deported from Cuba, and a Master in Education from St Thomas University in Minnesota. Her work has been documented in "Making Caribbean Dance" as well as "Lavil: Life, Love, and Death in Port-au-Prince (Voice of Witness)." In 2018, Dienane received the Award of Excellence from the Haitian Community of Minnesota and the NAACP. Her latest work is her first children's book, "The Mermaid and the Whale", published in August 2020 and her second book and CD "Ti Sonson ak Pouvwa Tanbou" published in October 2023. She is currently a teaching artist at the Saint Paul Conservatory for the Performing Arts, MPR Classnotes, SELCO and COMPAS. She was the Co-choreograph at the MN Opera for the Anonymous lover production. She is the co-directed of the Afoutayi Dance Studio in Golden valley with her mother Florencia Pierre. Florencia "FoFo" Pierre - Cultural Director of Afoutayi. Florencia Pierre has dedicated her life to teaching the stories, songs, and rhythms that form the foundation of traditional Haitian culture. Born in La Gonâve, Haiti, Florencia "Fofo" Pierre is an accomplished dancer, choreographer, singer, actress, educator, costume designer, chef, traditional healer, and Mambo (priestess in the Vodou religion). She was a principal dancer of the National Dance Theater of Haiti and the Vivianne Gauthier School of Traditional Arts. as well as a faculty member of ENARTS Ecole Nationale des Arts in Haiti, and the founder and director of the esteemed Institute de Danse JAKA where she trained dancers and musicians in Haitian traditional dances and theater for over 30 years. She is the Cultural Director of Afoutayi and the founder of the Institut de Danse JAKA and she is currently the Founder of Kay Fofo & TSK (Two Non Profit organizations that help children go to school

and help their family create small business to support themselves and their community in Lagonav, and Thomassin in Haiti). Ms. Pierre has been featured in "Walking on Fire: Haitian Women's Stories of Survival and Resistance" by Beverly Bell and Edwidge Danticat and was also featured in the first movie produced in Haiti titled "Anita", and the movie Liberte, Egalite, Fraternite et puis apres by Jean Rouch. Having performed throughout the Caribbean, Europe, and the United States, Florencia Pierre has been the cultural consultant at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival for Once On This Island and the ALAFIA Dance company for their Ethnic Dance Festival performance. Christian still continues to do what he loves the most, teaching West African music and dances in schools, community centers, parks, festivals, and weddings.

Alanna Morris is a Dancer-Choreographer, Educator, and Artist Organizer, born and raised in Brooklyn, New York of Afro-Caribbean descent and currently residing in Saint Paul, MN. She danced with TU Dance in St. Paul. Minnesota under Artistic Directors, Toni Pierce-Sands and Uri Sands from 2007–2017. She's been named Dance Magazine's "25 to Watch!," City Pages' Artist of the Year and Best Choreographer. She has received fellowships from the McKnight Foundation for Dance (2015) and Choreography (2021) and Springboard Danse Montreal (2022). She is the Founder and Artistic Director of I A.M. Arts, working in the non profit sector to support critical dance performance, holistic arts education, and community life. Currently developing a thesis around the divinity of blackness and the eternal validity of the soul. Black Light is methodology, praxis and performance art project, being researched in phases over multiple years through collaborative solo performance, teaching and residency. Alanna is touring Let The Crows Come and Invisible Cities in 2024. directed by Ashwini Ramaswamy. Alanna is a Visiting Professor of Dance at Carleton College and a graduate of The Juilliard School.

Thomasina Petrus is a professional jazz singer and 30 year equity actor. She cultivated her talents through mentorships and friendships of the twin cities' most beloved artists, who encouraged her to continue creating exceptional music and theater by launching Thomasina Productions. Currently Rocssy Mahania teaches weekly drum classes in Oakland, in Santa Cruz, California, as well as Nevada City.

Karen Aaron grew up in central Canada, loves snow and embraces winter sports. She is an avid nordic skier and triathlete who is passionate about teaching adults of all ages to ski and bike. Karen works with her husband to manage a World Tour pro cycling team that races all over the world called Human Powered Health. She has always been interested in Afro Caribbean Dance and Latin music but it was not until her early forties that she began lessons with amazing local Cuban dancers and in 2023 began classes at Afoutavi with Florencia Pierre "Fofo" and Djenane Saint Juste. He pursued a degree in dance at the University of Minnesota, graduating with a Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts. During his undergraduate years, Romero had the privilege of dancing in works by Dr. Gaynell Sherrod and Robert Moses. As he evolved into a burgeoning dance artist, Romero continued his exploration of movement with the TU Dance CULTIVATE program. Simultaneously, he furthered his education by earning a Master's in Education and obtaining a tier 3 teaching license, showcasing his commitment to both artistic expression and educational advancement.

Rose Perou is a 25-year-old Haitian-American who enjoys learning about Haitian culture, including dance, history, and food. She started learning about Haitian Dance and Culture with Afoutayi in 2022. 

Concerto Dance by Jolene Konkel creates jazz and modern dance works driven by musicality and virtuosity.

Our mission is to explore work that strengthens and uplifts the human spirit, aiming to inspire hope and build community connections through vibrant concert dance. Concerto Dance creates jazz and modern dance works driven by musicality and virtuosity. Our mission is to explore work that strengthens and uplifts the human spirit, aiming to inspire hope and build community connections through vibrant concert dance.

Our signature jazz dance style blends vernacular and classical jazz dance to create high energy and distinctly musical performances with theatrical flair. Our work seeks to honor the African Diasporic roots of jazz and celebrate the diverse cultural influences woven across all American dance forms we engage with. Concerto Dance believes dance is a means of expressing joy, an integral part of community, and a part of what it means to be human.

We desire to create artistically compelling and entertaining concert dance that engages a broad audience. Since its founding in the Fall of 2019, Concerto Dance has created and premiered multiple dance works including a dance film Awakenings filmed in Northfield, MN, an original evening length jazz dance work, Girls in the Band, conceived and directed by Konkel that celebrates the often untold stories of female jazz musicians and composers from the 1930's to today, and has presented several new works including premieres from national visiting guest artists in addition to multiple works by Jolene Konkel. Choreographers Note

Ode to Opus Jazz was inspired by Jerome Robbins' 1958 work, "NY Export: Opus Jazz" and originally premiered in 2018 in celebration of Robbins' centennial, and has become a signature work of Concerto Dance. The work navigates the challenges of an explosive and turbulent world through resilience, friendship, and young love utilizing vernacular and classic jazz dance with theatrical flair.

In 1958 Jerome Robbins created "NY Export: Opus Jazz" for his company Ballets: USA as an abstract "ballet in sneakers." He was searching for a new dance language found in the Latin and African rooted music and vernacular dance styles of the time. He wanted to break away from the traditions of ballet to find a more relevant means of expressing and embodying the emotions of American youth culture dealing with the "explosive and turbulent world around them."

Ballets: USA was also one of the first inter racial companies during a time when blacks and whites did not typically share the stage, especially in the ballet world. The original choreography was passed down to me as a young dancer from my ballet teacher who performed in the original work, and I quickly identified with and fell in love with the movement. "Ode to Opus Jazz," is an original work inspired by the legacy Robbins left and my early roots as a dancer. Revisiting the work much has changed, and yet it still remains relevant as we find ourselves once again dealing with a "turbulent and explosive world around us." The work calls on our collective humanity to come together, to celebrate one another, to say "I got your back," and to move forward through this explosive world with dignity and style. That's jazz.

Choreographer

Jolene Konkel (began her dance training in Milwaukee under William Reilly, a descendant of Jerome Robbin's Ballets: USA and at the Milwaukee Ballet, Milwaukee High School of the Arts, and Danceworks. While there she performed with the Milwaukee Ballet, the Milwaukee Opera Company and Danceworks before relocating to Chicago to study at Gus Giordano's, Lou Conte Dance Studio, and the Joel Hall Dance Center. She went on to pursue a BFA in dance at the University of Minnesota studying under Zoe Sealy, Cathy Young, and Danny Buraczeski, and later completed her MFA in Performance and Choreography through the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. As a choreographer Ms. Konkel's work spans both musical theater as well as concert dance and has been presented at the University of Wisconsin, the University of Minnesota "Jazz Here, Jazz Now", the University of Northwestern, Belhaven University, Renovate Choreographers Evening at the Ritz Theatre, MN Fringe, Zenon Dance Zone, Patrick's Cabaret, The Old Arizona, Rhythmically Speaking (2008, 2011, and 2018), and at the Bloomington Center for the Arts.

Her work in music theater has been showcased multiple times at the International Thespian Festival, Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival, and at the American Alliance for Theatre and Education. In addition to her work as a choreographer, Ms. Konkel has been educating dancers for over two decades and is passionate about teaching jazz dance technique from a historical perspective, dance history, and choreography. Jolene is the founder and Artistic Director of Concerto Dance and is thrilled to be making her choreographic debut at the Cowles Center in the Fall Forward Festival.

Performers
